Do you know what it is like to be forced to live in a certain neighborhood because of the color of your skin?

Have you ever been silenced and overlooked?

My conversations with you tell me about you in more ways than what is expressed by your words because I have had a great deal of practice with making environmental assessments! Don't misunderstand. I love my life and I would not trade it for anything.

I move like this because that is how God created me!
